She mentors the participants to explore a career in the clerical field, an area that has expanded beyond that of a traditional secretary. As many as three participants learn how to answer the phone and direct calls, greet the public, doing data entry on the computer, and providing clerical support to all the staff along with other duties to help SAPCC run smoothly. The reception area can be a very busy place!

Tienna puts her interest in clothes and fashion to good use at Myrtle's Closet—A Thrift Store. She is one of the staff who regularly covers some of the hours at Myrtles and also serves as a mentor to the LT participants at this worksite.

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### An Experience to Remember

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ATLANTA, GA November 7-10, 2012

The National Association for the Education of Young Children Conference was held in Atlanta, Georgia on November 6-12, 2012.

I had the wonderful opportunity to attend this conference with thousands of other early childhood educators.

Listening to all the experiences of others was so beneficial. We were able to exchange great ideas and really focus on specific topics.

A wide range of child development topics were covered, but one the most fascinating was called "Supporting Relationships between infants: A case study of two Babies".


The case study was with two infants, a boy and a girl, who were three months old at the start. For this experiment they positioned the babies on their backs side by side close enough to touch, sharing a mobile overhead. Other positions include facing each other on their tummies with materials to share such as soft blocks, laying them side by side on their tummies facing a mirror and placing them in seats face to face where they were able to touch feel and lean towards each other for further contact.

The teachers used materials to promote sharing and were surprised at how the babies responded. They observed the babies intentionally comforting each other, sharing, showing empathy and initiating interactions with other babies. The teachers also noted clear peer preferences and how the demonstrated separation anxiety when "their" baby was not there. The teachers firmly believed that those babies were forming friendships at a very young age.

I was fascinated by this study and the pictures presented truly spoke volumes. All in all, it was a very worthwhile experience that I recommend to any childcare professional.


Betsy brings excitement and enthusiasm to the LT classroom. Her engaging manner and insight draws you into the wonder of what is around us in the "science" world. The students are led in experiments in nature, using resources that we have available right on the SAPCC site on the Black River as well field Trips to Springweather Nature Center and the Springfield Bog. In the outdoor classroom, students have discovered tracks of animals that have visited the banks of the river and wondered why might they be there? What are they looking for? Beaver activity, unique plant life in the Bog as well as



indigenous plant and trees where all observed and recorded in the students science journals and all the findings discussed in the field as well as in the classroom.

Betsy has based her science class teachings on the Vermont Institute of Natural Science text, "Hands-On Nature Information and Activities for Exploring the Environment with Children". This has been a staple in many classrooms throughout the state where volunteers bring science to the elementary classroom through interactive and exciting approaches.

The Learning Together program is an intensive parent training program for pregnant and parenting teens and young parents offered by Parent Child Centers throughout the state. Participants work on high school diplomas, job training skills and more during the year round, four days a week program.

We've also focused on cooking projects from around the world. Each day we cooked something to reflect a different country's culture using food. The children made German apple pancakes and scones from Scotland. The preschoolers got to make and eat their creations. They measured the ingredients which is a fun way to learn math concepts. Cooking projects that the children actually make also encourages them to try new foods to eat. It also allowed us to ask lots of open ended

questions to enhance the cognitive and language skills during the process.
